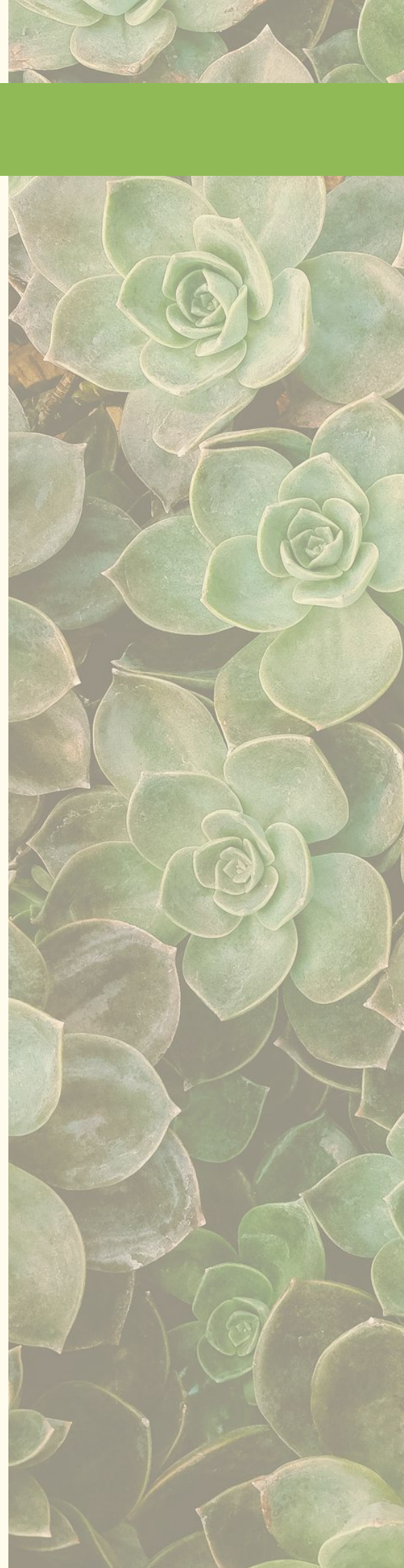
Nature and purpose of the award

As part of Christian Literature Fund (CLF)'s commitment to environmental justice an annual prize, which includes a prize money of R10,000, is awarded for environmental conservation and justice.

The award seeks to give recognition to individuals and organisations who strive to preserve the environment in its many forms by:

- publications, media or projects;
- to influence public consciousness, in order to develop increased appreciation for the environment, as well as:
- our call to the conservation thereof, in terms of general Christian (Biblical) values and principals.

The name of the award is linked to the environmental journalist Elise Tempelhoff, out of appreciation for her sustained contribution to environmental conservation and justice.

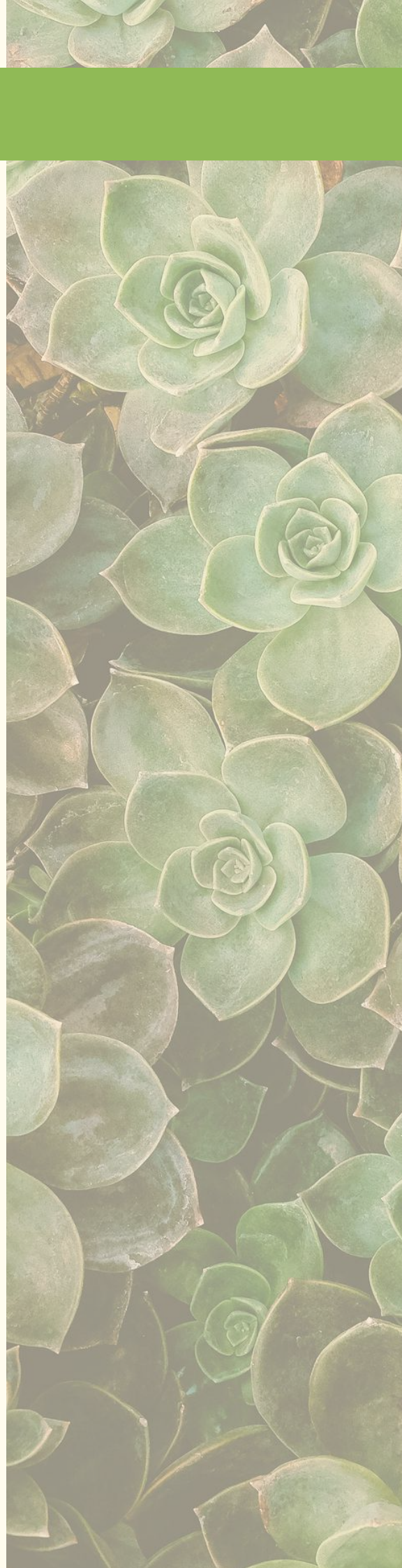


Categories

Three categories are distinguished for the assessment of public contributions for the award. The focus on the three categories will shift annually in turn, so that each category gets the opportunity to be highlighted in a given year:

Year one: Individuals and organisations that by sustained and prolonged public actions and organised projects, on ground of general Christian (Biblical) values, make a significant impact on the society's awareness of the need for environmental justice and thus contribute to constructive involvement at environmental justice.

Year two: Popular publications, media presentations, photographic articles / exhibition, and documentaries that as a single project or as a series of presentations to encourage greater sensitivity of the environment. The project can present the case of environmental sensitivity based on various points of departure.



Year three: Academic (theological) publications on any aspect of environmental justice based on general Christian (Biblical) values, which were published in the previous three years by publishers, and which affected the public awareness of environmental justice. The publications may include dissertations, theses and electronic works published by publishers on official platforms.

Criteria for assessment of each category

Year one: Individuals and organisations (activism / advocacy):

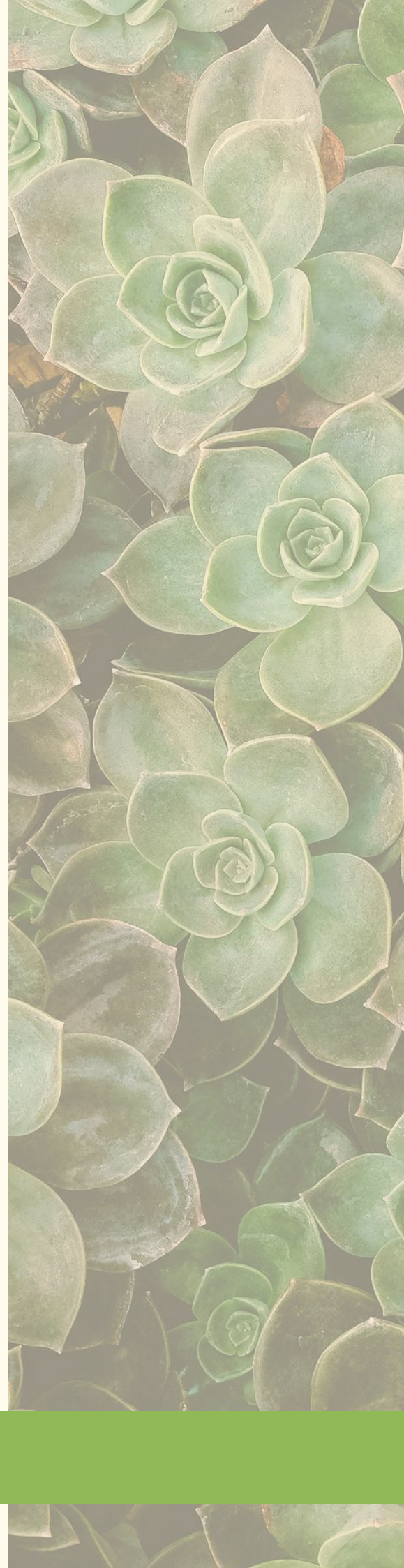
- Organised and dedicated activities, programmes and projects by individuals or collective agencies, in any branch of environmental justice, based on general Christian (Biblical) values;
- Indication of the individual or collective agency's sustained and prolonged public action and organised projects, as well as its impact on the consciousness of individuals and communities;



- Indication of purposeful and active networking with a view to influencing individuals and communities with regard to environmental justice;
- Examples of specific activities and projects.

Year two: Popular contributions:

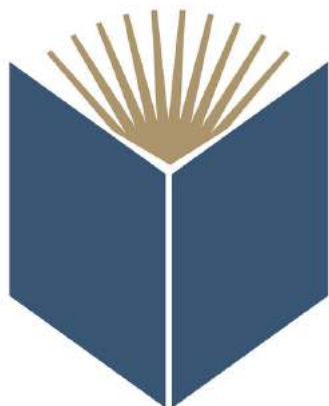
- Short information sheets, videos and other written, auditory, or visual presentations which is aimed at raising awareness of environmental justice: single project or series of presentations, on the ground of various points of departure.
- Review of the theme, message and medium of presentation in terms of impact and professionalism.
- Discounting of the publication or platform where the contribution was placed, the specific target group of the communication medium and the response of the community on the contribution (where possibly available).



Year three: Academic (Christian theological) publications

- Academic work in any branch of environmental justice that is entered by registered publishers, including dissertations, theses and electronic contributions that appear on publishers' official platforms;
- Within the context of current theological debates;
- That which makes an original scholarly contribution.
